Colonel Geoffrey Sparrow peaceably passed away at home at the age of ninety one. In the weeks before his death his health had deteriorated and yet his graciousness was apparent for all to see. Before he died he passed on this poem to me by Ann Weems which he thought may be of some future use. Although intended for Lent the words take on a power and intensity when you consider they were read by someone nearing the end of their life.

The clergyman who was voted UK Yachtsman of the Year 2013

What will you be doing this summer? Chances are, you will NOT be sailing a small boat across freezing Arctic waters. Yet last summer, that is exactly what the 78 year-old Rev Bob Shepton was doing. It won him the prize of Apollo/Yachting Journalists' Association Yachtsman of the Year Award for 2013. That must be an absolute 'first' for a retired Anglican clergyman!

The citation ran as follows: 'The Rev Bob Shepton completed the unique feat of sailing his 33ft sloop through hostile Arctic conditions of the North West Passage in both directions in successive years. His latest voyage west to east, last July (2013), aged 78, was in particularly bleak conditions, and the feat was managed by only three boats last year.'

It was a long way from the more populated places where Mr Shepton once ministered. He was a full time youth leader at the Cambridge University Mission in Bermondsey, the Warden of the Oxford Kilburn Club, and worked for a while at the Mayflower Family Centre when David Sheppard, later Bishop of Liverpool, was Warden. He later served as chaplain of two slightly specialist schools. But these days he cruises extensively in the Arctic on his 33ft Westerly, Dodo's Delight.

As the citation described his trip last summer: 'He faced extremely harsh conditions with 30-40 per cent more ice than usual and strong headwinds. This led to no spring at all in Alaska, and rivers frozen later than at any time in 96 years. Yet, as well as completing the passage successively, he also found time to carry out underwater filming for a Scottish marine biology consultancy to analyse the Arctic seabed flora.'

The Rev Bob Shepton, who is also ex-Royal Marines, has been called by sailing professionals "one of the most remarkable voyagers of our times." In the past 25 years he has sailed over 130,000 miles in every latitude from the Arctic to the Antarctic. In the 1990s, he took a crew of school leavers from his last school to sail round the world via Antarctica and Cape Horn. He has recently led several expeditions to Greenland and arctic Canada sailing and making first ascents of mountains and rock faces from the boat. He and his team were awarded the Piolets d'Or in 2011, probably the most prestigious mountaineering award.

As for this summer? He says: 'I am just about to return to Greenland with the 'Wild Bunch', who aren't wild at all except when rejoicing at the top of their incredible first ascents of big rock climbs. The plan is to sail across to the east coast of Baffin Island when the ice clears for them to put up some more superb new big wall routes. As I have said in my book, 'challenge is the name of the game'; the Christian life is a challenge, and maybe exposing yourself to danger, risk and challenge is a reflection of that and a training towards it.'

World War 1 in Nether Alderley

Last September, a tiny seed of an idea began to grow into a fascinating journey of research. Over the last 10 years I have delved into the Church's history but deciding to concentrate my new efforts on the WW1 era in Nether Alderley, has taken me down a completely new path of discovery.

We have two wonderful WW1 memorials in the church listing 18 men on our "Roll of Honour". My first quest was to track down as much information as I could about each name. Only one still eludes me!

I have been given invaluable items from Beryl Bardsley, whose uncle, Walter Rawlins is amongst our fallen. She has passed on to me various letters and documents including his medals and the original Memorial Plaque and Scroll which were sent to the soldiers next of kin after the war had ended.

Another item Beryl has passed over to me is a large photograph of our main War Memorial as it was originally, showing the statue of St George. (Sadly this statue was stolen during the 1980's)

I have spent many hours at Wilmslow library using the micro film machine, scanning through the local papers for the years 1913 to 1922 and also many hours at home 'googling', unearthing some fascinating information.

It is hard to believe that in such a small village as Nether Alderley so much war work was undertaken. Food parcels were being organised for POW, a hospital supply depot was set up in the Rectory and there was a hospital in Alderley Park (and another just down the road in Alderley Edge), I have collected several photos of Alderley Park hospital together with a unique autograph book signed by some of the patients!

I've also unearthed facts about a relationship between Lord Asquith (Prime Minister 1908 – 1916) and Venetia Stanley (youngest daughter of the Fourth Baron Sheffield and Stanley of Alderley). This would explain why Lord Asquith was such a frequent visitor to Alderley during those war years!

All in all this research results in an interesting collection! Please do come along to our forthcoming Open Weekend to view this exhibition.

The Walking Group goes Continental!

Having had three years of short walking holidays in the UK, the Group decided to spread its wings and fly off to France this year. The idea came from a visit to Brittany last year by Jamie and Lynn Smith who discovered an area there that was ideal for walking. Alongside that they had found a small complex of gites in a group of old farm buildings that would accommodate the Group.

And so it was that on Saturday 31st May we set off to Brittany. Nine of us were originally due to go but for unavoidable reasons the group were then five hardy souls. Travelling by various means we met at Landivisian, about 20 miles east of Brest, for lunch and to raid the supermarkets for provisions before travelling to our base at Tilibrennou. This is a hamlet about 3 miles north of Huelgoat (nobody managed to find the correct French pronunciation of that name, even from the locals). Geographically we are now about 15 miles due west of Brest. We occupied two of the four gites available, arranged so that we could pop in and out of each other's across the yard.

The area turned out to be a walkers' paradise. It consisted of rolling hills and woods with a feast of historical and geological interest. Jamie had a range of walks already sorted out for the next six days. The weather was ideal being sunny and warm but not too hot. On our first day we set out from Huelgoat through sun-dappled woods following an old canal built to supply a now abandoned silver mine (circa 1700). Visiting the site of the mine we then carried on to view another speciality of the area of huge round boulders, some the size of houses, formed during the Ice Age and seemingly just dumped all over. Many had evocative names to give an added sense of history to the area. On another day we went north to Perros-Guirec above Lannion and followed a coastal path to view the amazing rock formations of these boulders stacked high on top of each other. Their colour was of a soft pink granite that glowed in the sunlight. One morning was also spent visiting the market in Huelgoat to experience the atmosphere and test the local produce. Whilst there, Janice could not stop herself seeking out the local patisserie to check out her taste buds.

Lynn Smith, ably assisted by Fiona Ablett and Janice Sweetman, created gastronomic delights each evening and we assisted the French in helping to deal with their grape based produce. The highly competitive Janice also organised the evenings' activities; she even persuaded Jamie Smith to give each of us a ride on the back of his tandem. Jamie manfully set out on his bike each morning to visit the local boulangerie so we had fresh baguettes and croissants for breakfast each day. So after a lovely six days of activity and enjoying good company three of the Group returned to the UK the following Saturday, leaving Jamie and Lynn to enjoy a well-deserved rest for a week in another gite in Normandy.

WAR HOSPITAL SUPPLY DEPOTS

MRS WELLAND, ALDERLEY RECTORY

(wife of Canon Cecil Brooke Welland, Rector of Alderley 1912 – 1944)

Where did all the bandages come from? Who supplied the nightshirts, gowns and bed-jackets for soldiers in hospital? Almost all were hand-made by groups and individuals world-wide, often paying for the materials out of their own pockets.

The Central Work Rooms in London were instituted in 1915, when it was considered desirable to co-ordinate the activities of working parties throughout the country and thus avoid overlapping. The Central Work Rooms gathered together willing women from all parts of the suburbs and those who lived further afield set up Supply Depots where local women could contribute their time and skills. There were more than 2,700 of these Work Parties and depots at home and abroad, and now their contribution has been largely forgotten, but without them supplies of dressings and garments to many hospitals would have been non-existent. They certainly deserve a mention, and their work recorded as an example of the importance of voluntary work during the Great War.

The fee for registration was 2/6 per depot irrespective of the number of workers. Every depot was enrolled (a) under its registered number, (b) by the County, and (c) by the name of its Head. All groups were sent a small Red Cross flag, bearing their registered number, labels for dispatch of their supplies direct to the Stores Department, papers giving the conditions under which their respective members could qualify for Certificates and Voluntary Workers' Badges, and periodical information as to Hospital requirements.
