Rector Writes

December 2017

Recently I bought a favourite book of mine from when I was a boy: the AA Book of the Road. I can relive the childhood pleasure of losing myself in the book's many black and white drawings: specially commissioned vignettes, each presenting a distinctive feature of England and Wales in the late 1950s. These show major landmarks, humble local features and peculiarities, follies and noteworthy historic locations. The gazetteer lists every city, town and village. It presents a nation of early closing days, market days and the nearest golf course. Before any motorway or satnav, it is a book of the open two or three lane road, and it's a source of that coveted knowledge – the best way to drive from A to B. The world has changed in so many ways.

I am disappointed to find that Nether Alderley (listed as 'See Alderley Edge') is not illustrated and that Great Warford is missing completely. Even so, I take pleasure in living in the kind of place that is illustrated in the Book of the Road (1957), and in living in a part of England that still has old, broad main roads sweeping through the landscape.

The challenge for the church in every parish is to maintain its ancient roots, whilst also being renewed in every generation. An ancient church gives the weight of history that we all need, but we need more than history for Christian faith to thrive. A parish church needs to serve all generations and be a place where each generation plays its successive part. This was on the agenda for the Church Council of St.Mary's Church when it met in November.

The Parish Hall Restoration project is an opportunity to stimulate interest in St.Mary's Church. If a team of five is interested and committed, I would like to start Messy Church in the Parish Hall after Easter. What opportunities are there for different kinds of worship? How can your parish church serve you better through new activities and opportunities? What can we do to serve young families? My dear Nephew Darren

It was delightful to have a family from your church visiting ours last week, but perhaps if it happens again, you may suggest a certain dress code to them. That the man arrived without wearing a tie was probably forgivable, but I do think you should have warned them about the temperature. Your church building may be warmer than a nursing home, but the only time that hot air is blown over the heads of our congregation, is when the archdeacon preaches.

Thus, by early December, our congregation knows to come to church equipped with overcoats, scarves, gloves and thermal socks. And the Verger's regular disappearance into the side chapel during Services isn't on urgent ecclesiastical business, but to warm himself up with copious swigs from his hip flask.

The history and origin of Christmas carols can be traced back to thousands of years. The concept of carols is thought to have spread from Europe, where they were sung for the first time. However, these songs were not actually Christmas carols. In fact, they were considered as Pagan songs, which were sung at the Winter Solstice, celebrated by Pagans on 22nd December. These songs were sung in a lively and joyous manner for all the four seasons and gradually came to be known as carols, meaning songs of praise and joy.



Initially, many churches turned down the idea of singing Christmas carols, since it was considered to be a pagan custom that could not be included in the sacred church services. However, folk songs or carols depicting the Nativity Scene were written in the countryside. These simple songs soon gained popularity. In 1223, Saint Francis of Assisi, the Roman Catholic saint of animals and environment, introduced carols to the church services. These carols were loosely based on the Bible and were not hymns, but carols meant for entertainment and not loaded with biblical references.

The early carols were sung at homes rather than at places of worship. These early carols were not written, they were passed on from person to person. Carols gained wide popularity during the 14th century, when they started gaining the form of religious songs, whose theme revolved around the Christ Child or the Virgin Mary. Most of these carols were written by blending together English and Latin words.

By the beginning of 15th century, carols had become art music. During this period, special arrangements were made to sing carols. They were considered an important contribution to the growth of English medieval music. However, an obstacle soon came in the way of the popularity of carols, in the form of Puritans who came to power in England in 1647. During their reign, everything that related to Christmas and Christianity was strictly prohibited. As time passed, the popularity of carols faltered and they almost disappeared. It was during 19th century, Christmas re-gained its popularity.

Many composers played a part in re-popularizing carols. People now wanted to listen to more and more carols, which had come closer to Christmas and started to be known as Christmas carols. This is how the modernised version of Christmas carols was introduced. They were no more restricted to private places, like home. Choir singers began singing Christmas carols, based on biblical versus, at the churches also and they ceased to be mere forms for entertainment. It was around this time only that singing Christmas carols in the streets gained popularity and street carolers evolved.

Churches Together in Alderley AGM

'Churches Together in Alderley' co-ordinates the churches of Alderley Edge plus St.Mary's, Alderley working together to show that the churches are united in Jesus Christ. If you care about the churches working together please be at the Annual General Meeting of Churches Together in Alderley on Monday 29th January at St.Pius Church, Stamford Road, Alderley Edge at 7.30pm.

Advent Sunday is the start of the Christian year: it's the start of things. At the start of his ministry, Our Lord announced that the Kingdom of God was at hand and that all should repent and believe the good news of salvation. In Advent, Christians remember that, against the background of Christmas being celebrated early, ultimate things rest with God in Christ.

So the first day of Advent is a solemn Sunday when Christians ground themselves in their mortality and in their trust in God who is Lord of Time and Space. On Advent Sunday at St.Mary's Church there will not be a 6.30pm service, and instead we will meet with all the churches in the greater Alderley area at St.Philip and St.James Church at Alderley Edge at 6.30pm for a special Advent service.

CARING FOR THE CARERS

Twenty two people came to the Caring for the Carers service at St.Mary's Church on Sunday 22nd October. I think most present had been carers in the past. This makes you more acutely aware of what carers known to you now are going through. The service was an opportunity to acknowledge the self-sacrificial task of carers and to pray for them.
