**Rector Writes:**

**June 2014**

“But Jesus said, Suffer little children, and forbid them not, to come to me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven” *Matthew 19:14*

Our Lord's whole ministry was a statement – not just the words he spoke but also his actions. In the episode above Jesus may have been concerned specifically about children being denied access to him. However, there is something in what Jesus says that applies to every person regardless of age that we should never be prevented from accessing God. Jesus is 'God with us' Emmanuel. He is God made flesh, the incarnate deity. To stop people coming to Jesus is to stop people coming to God. Jesus wants us to draw near with faith and receive the gift of God's presence. Jesus even says that we all need to become like children to enter the Kingdom of God. We need to be open and enthusiastic in our lives of faith and like children approach both the world and God with a sense of wonder.

I recently visited both the Roman Catholic and Anglican Cathedrals in Liverpool. Both have carved depictions in stone of the little children coming to Jesus. Jesus' ministry was characterised by radical accessibility – he broke down barriers to bring people into a relationship with God. These barriers were religious, economic, social and racial. Jesus wanted people to encounter the love God had for them unimpeded by humanly devised barriers. Although Jesus' ministry on earth was over two thousand years ago in a culture and society much different from our own he remains remarkable fresh. This is because as human beings we are still trying to put barriers up and obstacles in people's paths. The fact there are two Cathedrals in Liverpool speaks about division but the fact they work so closely together is hope that we can be united in proclaiming the same message of love.

To receive in faith the gift of the Eucharist is to receive the Lord himself. We need to work passionately as a Church to bring greater access to the Eucharist. This sacrament given by Christ himself assures the faithful of Christ's continued presence with them. It is being united with Christ's spirit that we can be transformed by it. We can be empowered to break down barriers and be inspired to see each person as valuable and precious in God's sight. The Eucharist transcends us as individuals in time and space. It reaches back to former generations and will reach forward to generations yet to be born. It is Christ's gift to the whole world and although entrusted to the Church it is certainly not ours to possess. Christ makes the invitation to draw near with faith and it is our joy and responsibility to make the journey to the altar an unimpeded one. Therefore we need to ask ourselves if we stop God's children drawing near with faith and if we do we must make every effort to break down barriers so that Christ can be made known to the world

## WW1: THEY WENT WITH SONGS TO THE BATTLE



'We don't want to lose you, but we think you ought to go', sang music hall star Vesta Tilley in the Summer of 1914, when theatre stages became recruiting centres as young men, urged on by their girl-friends and wives, made their way forward to offer themselves for military service. This was, of course, in those first heady months of the war, the 'over by Christmas' time, when not to volunteer was to risk being given a white feather of cowardice in the street. Rapidly a huge volunteer army was assembled, and soon made its way to the western front.

The songs of the music-hall went with them - indeed, this was an army that sang and whistled its way into those muddy trenches and kept on singing, even when it turned out that the war was going to be long, bitter and brutal. 'Pack up your troubles in your old kitbag', they sang, 'and smile, smile, smile'. All that was needed was a 'lucifer to light your fag'. After all, 'What's the use of worrying - it never was worthwhile'. Soon that song was joined by others: 'Mademoiselle from Armentieres, parlez-vous?' 'It's a long way to Tipperary' and so on.

The songs of the music hall became the songs of the battle-field. Soldiers on leave or in 'Blighty' for medical treatment sat in the cheap seats and sang their heads off, while a singer on stage, often wearing patriotic uniform, marched up and down orchestrating the performance. ('Blighty' incidentally was the soldiers' slang for Britain or home - it's from an Urdu word brought back from India by a previous generation of soldiers, and actually means 'European'.)

When, in his most famous poem For the Fallen, Laurence Binyon wrote that 'they went with songs to the battle' he was stating the truth. 'Pack up your Troubles' was the defining song of the trenches, though in the harsh light of reality its message seems a bit like whistling in the dark.

As the war went on and year followed year, so the songs tended to change their mood. In 1918 it was Ivor Novello's first great hit, 'Keep the home fires burning . . . till the boys come home' that stirred the audiences' hearts. The same shift occurred in the Second World War, from the confident 'We're going to hang out our washing on the Siegfried Line' in 1939 to Vera Lynn's plangent voice assuring war-weary troops in 1944 that 'We'll meet again, don't know where, don't know when'.

Popular songs, in other words, captured very accurately the mood and heart of the nation. As they always have been, their trade secrets were smiles and tears.

## Fire Notice

There are three Fire Exits from this building:

- a. South Porch (Main Entrance).
- b. West Door (via Choir Vestry)
- c. North Door (via Rectors Vestry)

- Before any service commences, all designated Fire Exits must be unlocked and security bars removed. A regular check will be made to confirm that that all Fire Exit doors can be opened.
- Where additional seating is used for larger services, it is essential that this is not placed in such a way as to restrict access to any Fire Exit.
- Emergency lighting is not installed in this Church; a torch is available in the Choir Vestry.

## Fire Alarm System

- There is no Fire Alarm system in this building

**Fire Extinguishers are available in the building in the following locations:**

- a. Foam (door to Rectors vestry)
- b. Water (Column by
- c. Foam (Choir Vestry)
- d. Powder (Choir Vestry)
- e. CO2 (Bell Tower)
- f. Boiler Room

Unless trained, please do not attempt to use a Fire Extinguisher. Responsibility for using fire extinguishers will be allocated to named and trained Warden's / Sidespeople.

## Procedure in the event of discovering a Fire

1. On discovering a Fire, immediately notify the Priest in Charge or Warden on duty.
2. An announcement to evacuate the building will be made by the Priest in Charge or Warden.
3. Do not take any risks; leave the building in an orderly manner by the nearest Fire Exit.
4. Report to the **Fire Assembly point** which is in the **turn front of the Parish Hall**

5. The emergency services will be contacted immediately by the Warden on duty.
6. Do not attempt to re-enter the building until instructed that it is safe to do so by a member of the Fire Brigade, Priest in Charge or Warden on duty.

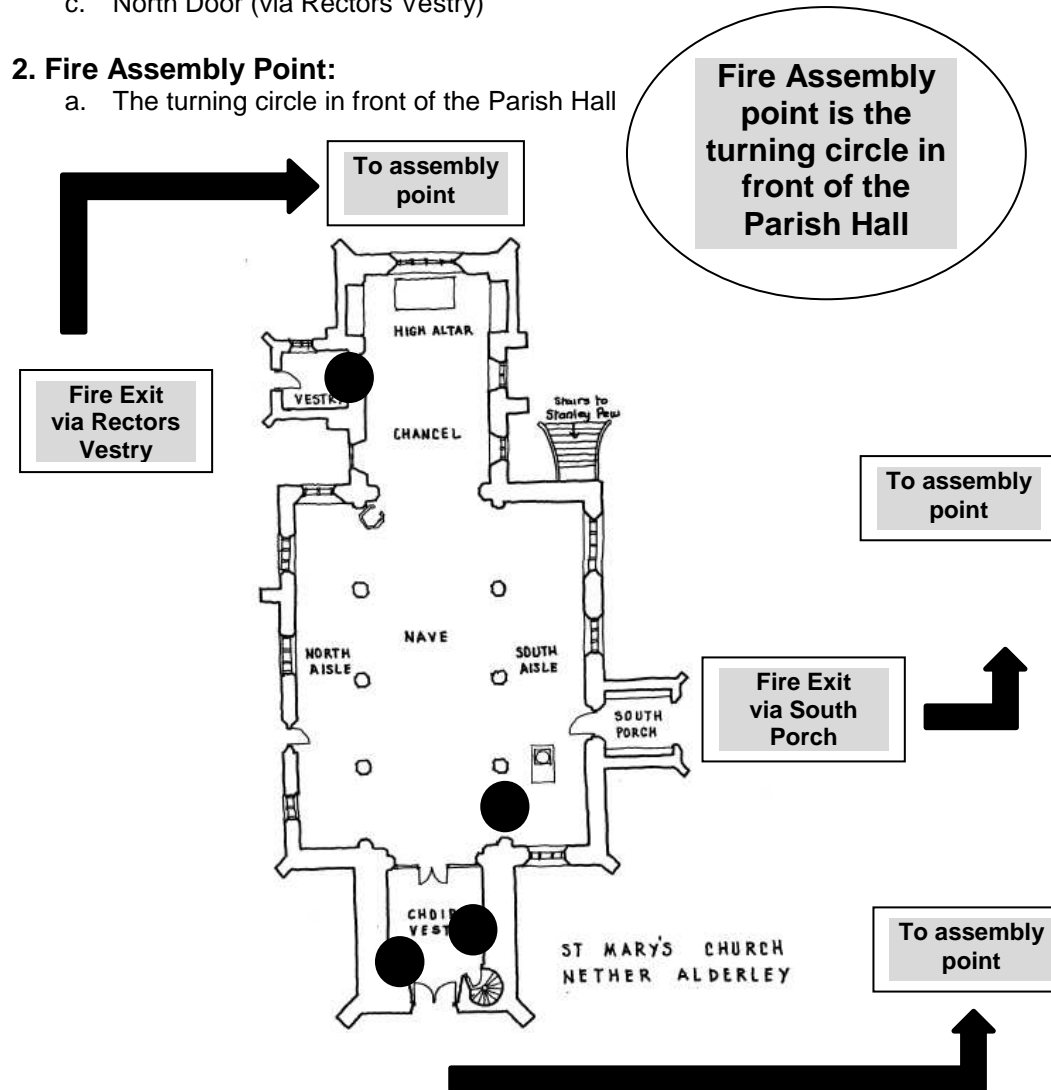
## Plan of St Mary's Church

## The Memorial Plaque



In October 1916, the British Government set up a committee regarding the idea for a commemorative memorial plaque that could be given to the relatives of men and women whose deaths were attributable to the Great War of 1914-1918. Members of the committee were selected from the House of Commons, the House of Lords and some government departments. It was agreed that it would take the form of a small bronze plaque. In August 1917 the committee set up a competition for anyone to enter who could put forward a suitable design to record the name of a fallen British or Dominion Forces serviceman or woman.

There was such a lot of interest from people wanting to submit designs for the Memorial Plaque that the closing date was extended by a few weeks to 31<sup>st</sup> December 1917 (originally 1<sup>st</sup> November) so that servicemen on active service overseas would have an opportunity to submit a design. There were more than 800 entries to the competition from within the United Kingdom, from countries in the British Empire and from the theatres of war.

On 20<sup>th</sup> March 1918 the results of the competition were announced in The Times newspaper. This was the day before the German Army launched a massive surprise attack on several miles of the British Front on the Somme battlefield in France. By the end of the following day, there were several thousand more British casualties caused by this attack, whose names would be added to the list of those to be commemorated by this Memorial Plaque.

The design incorporated the figure of Britannia. She is facing to her left and holding a laurel wreath in her left hand over the box where the commemorated serviceman's name was to be placed. In her right hand she is holding a trident. In representation of Britain's sea power there are two dolphins each facing Britannia on her left and right sides.

A lion is standing in front of Britannia at her feet, also facing to the left with a menacing growl. As specified by the committee, the words "He died for freedom and honour" are written around the margin. A very small lion, with his head facing to the right can be seen underneath the larger lion's feet, biting into a winged creature representing the German Imperial eagle. The circular shape and coin-like appearance soon contributed to the nickname of this Memorial Plaque becoming widely known as the "Dead Man's Penny", the "Death Penny", "Death Plaque" or "Widow's Penny".
